

- Signposting


#### Body

Structured according to your key message e.g.:

- Point 1
- Point 2
- Point 3

#### Conclusion

- Bring together all the main points
- Restate your key message
- Implication or so what?

- What do you need to do in order to explain your argument/key message?
- How many steps will this take?
- How many points could you make in the time that you have?
- Which points are the macro (major/main) ideas and which are in support of those ideas (the details)?





### Reality



#### Everyone starts from a different place.

A few have many resources, many have some resources, some have no resources as well as additional obstacles.

#### Equality



The assumption is that everyone benefits from the same supports.
This is equal treatment.

#### Equity



Everyone gets the supports they need (this is the concept of affirmative action), thus producing equity.

#### Justice



All 3 can see the game without supports or accomodations because the cause(s) of the inequity was addressed. The systemic barrier is

still in place, but the impact is reduced.



# Conclusion

## The spotlight effect



#### Worried about fear and embarrassment?

- People pay much less attention to us than we think
- You're not alone, others don't like public speaking
  - The audience is on your side

### Reframe the scary connotations:

- Accept that presentations are a part of life
- Think of it as just a regular conversation
- If you feel discomfort, acknowledge that it is an emotion. It will pass.

Preparation = confidence

How do you practice for your presentations?



## Sound natural and knowledgeable



- Avoid scripting know your content
  - Use slides as cue cards
- Be passionate tone and interest
  - Make eye contact with your audience
- Adopt a professional but relaxed demeanour
  - Use spoken language



#### Reference your PowerPoint slides

- •Use a referencing system that is easy to read, like Harvard
- Have a reference list as a final slide

#### Remember

- a clear message will give you confidence
- practice
- get the timing right
- the audience is on your side
